NEERS BUSINESS

During the last Business Meeting there were a number of topics discussed and voted on. The first business worthy of discussion is the advent of the new DAVID DEAN STUDENT POSTER AWARD. The brainchild of Alan Young, this new award recognizes outstanding posters presented at NEERS meetings. It is named for the first President of NEERS who past on to greener estuaries a number of years ago. students will be eligible for this award which carries a \$100 prize for the winner. You will sign up for this award the same way you would sign up meeting for the other awards, through announcement and abstract submittal. membership also voted to increase the other awards and now the Ketchum, Rankin and Dean Awards all carry a \$100 purse for the winner.

To finance these new awards as well as the travel grants (see below), the members voted to increase the regular dues from \$10 to \$15 per year (still a bargain). Members also selected candidates for the upcoming elections on Block Island (see below). At the business meeting the perennial suggestion to change the name of NEERS to the

North East Estuarine Research Society came up once again (Judy Rankin suggested it this time). Since this will require changing the Constitution, a vote will be conducted in the Fall.

SCOTT WARREN - Connecticut College

It is not that I have lots of free time on my hands.....but NEERS has been great to and for me and my students, and it is time to give something back. As a professional society NEERS is simply The BEST! The science is rigorous, the scientists take their work seriously, but don't take themselves too seriously, and it is difficult to imagine a group of professionals that could be more supportive of students. A key challenge will be sustaining the high level of participation at our meetings - there seem to be more meetings and symposia scheduled every year, and we can only attend a few. NEERS needs to remain a "MUST MAKE" event! Maintaining a high level of student participation, and continuing to broaden the scope of topics will be critical.

BERNIE GARDNER - Univ of Massachusetts

I was honored and pleased when Fred Short called a couple of weeks ago to ask if I would run for President Elect of NEERS. Over the last few years I have developed a strong appreciation of the value of NEERS as user friendly scientific organization in providing a forum for the exchange of ideas and camaraderie among a wide range of estuarine researchers. Unfortunately, he also said that I had to write a 'campaign' statement for the newsletter. Normally this would be fine, but at the time I was frantically trying to get ready for a decidedly

non-estuarine research cruise, and I failed in my efforts to finish the statement before I left. I am now trying to compose a brief statement in the galley of the R/V New Horizon about 300 miles north of Hawaii on the way to San Diego. I suppose I shouldn't admit my foray into `blue water' in a campaign speech for an estuarine organization, but honesty is always best!

Seriously, I would very much like to serve as President-Elect, and then President of NEERS. I don't have many specific suggestions (promises?) because I feel that the organization has functioned very well under previous presidents, and I would primarily work to continue the NEERS tradition. There are two specific areas I would like to work First, as a physical oceanographer, I am sometimes struck by the limited representation in NEERS among estuarine physicists, and I would try to encourage a broader participation. I think we (physicists) have much to learn from members of NEERS and conversely can contribute much to NEERS. This is really isn't an effort to have somebody to talk to at meetings because I don't seem to have much problem with that anyway. It just seems that we should try to encourage participation by as many estuarine scientists as possible, and there might be fertile recruiting ground among this group. The second area I would concentrate on is the continued expansion of electronic communication among **NEERS** members. The list server has been useful, but over the next few years we can expand into an active WWW presence, allowing us to communicate better among ourselves, and to a wider audience as well.

This doesn't seem like much of a campaign statement, but it is about as good as I can do between the 20 degree rolls. I do hope the wind slows a bit soon! I look forward to seeing many of you at the fall meeting, and if you choose, to serving you as President in two years.



EDITORIAL
